

#### INTRODUCTION

"Catechesis aims to bring about in the believer an ever more mature faith in Jesus Christ, a deeper knowledge and love of his person and message, and a firm commitment to follow him." (*National Directory of Catechesis*, No. 19)

This revised Curriculum serves as the framework for religious instruction in all Catholic elementary schools and parish religious education programs in the Diocese of Raleigh. The goal is to assist all students to grow in an understanding of their faith as Roman Catholics and deepen their relationship with Jesus Christ.

"Faith must be known, celebrated, lived, and expressed in prayer. Catechesis comprises six fundamental tasks, each of which is related to an aspect of faith in Christ." (*National Directory of Catechesis*, No. 20) The Diocesan Religion Curriculum is rooted in these six fundamental tasks: Knowledge of Faith, Liturgical Education, Moral Education, Teaching to Pray, Education for Community Life, and Missionary Initiation.

The format for each grade begins with **Focus** topics to offer the teacher/catechist guidance in the key concepts to be covered. Each of the six tasks is delineated into two components: **Essential Concepts**, which are the broad categories repeated in every grade; and, **Core Content** that indicates specific knowledge students will recognize, know or be able to articulate at their grade level. It is important to recognize that certain elements of our faith are revisited in greater depth at each grade level of the Curriculum.

Related **Scripture** passages and references for the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* (**CCC**) provide the teacher/catechist with background knowledge and a deeper comprehension of the content. The **Vocabulary** identifies words or terms that will assist the student to better understand the concepts.

Finally, the **Appendix** offers supplementary information on the Blessed Virgin and Saints as well as the Sequence of Prayers and Precepts. Definitions and explanations of the vocabulary can be found in the **Glossary**, which references the *Catechism of the Catholic Church*, and also indicates the grade a student is expected to be able to articulate and use terms.

Advent	1	The beginning of the Church year that is a time of four weeks of preparation for the celebration of the birth of Christ at Christmas; from the Latin word for "coming". (CCC 524)
Advent Wreath	1	An evergreen wreath with four candles that are lighted successively in the weeks of Advent to symbolize the coming of Christ, the Light of the World.
Alb	5	The white robe the priest and deacon wear at Mass; from the Latin word for white and symbolic of purity; the garment of the baptized.
Altar	2	The table used for the celebration of Mass. (CCC 1182)
Ambo	3	The stand from which the Scriptures are proclaimed in Church; also called the lectern or pulpit.
Amen	2	The word used to conclude a prayer that means, "It is so".
Angel	1	A spiritual being, who is in heaven; from the Greek word for messenger. (CCC 328-336)
Annunciation	5	A liturgical solemnity commemorating the angel Gabriel announcing to Mary that she was to be the mother of the Son of God; first Joyful Mystery of the Rosary. (CCC 484)
Anointing of the Sick	2	A Sacrament of Healing given to a member of the faithful who is seriously ill or elderly, or preparing for surgery. (CCC 1511-1513)
Apparition	4	An appearance of a heavenly being (Christ, Mary, an angel or a saint) to people on earth.
Apostle	1	A title given to those chosen and sent by Jesus to preach the Gospel. (CCC 75-76)
Apostolic	3	One of the four marks of the Church that means the roots of the Church can be traced to the apostles; also the charge of the Church to bring the good news of salvation to the world. (CCC 857)
Ascension	8	Term given to the end of Jesus" earthly appearances forty days after his Resurrection; the second Glorious Mystery of the Rosary. (CCC 660-667)
Ash Wednesday	4	First day of Lent, a day of prayer, fasting and abstinence; the faithful receive ashes on their forehead as a sign of repentance.
Aspiration	3	A brief prayer such as "My Lord and my God".

Bishop	2	The highest of the three degrees of the sacrament of ordination; the bishop is appointed by the Pope to be the leader and teacher of a particular diocese. (CCC 886)
Blessed Sacrament	2	Jesus" presence in the consecrated bread or host, reserved in the tabernacle, for adoration and to be given to those receiving the Anointing of the Sick.
Blessing	2	A prayer to place a person, place, or thing under the care of God. (CCC 1671-1672)
Body of Christ	7	The human body of Christ on earth; the presence of Christ in the Eucharistic species; the Church who's head is Christ and members are the faithful. (CCC 467, 1374, 787-789)
Book of Blessings	7	The portion of the Roman Ritual, which contains the blessings of persons, place, and things, that was published by the Holy See in 1984.

Canonization	4	Process whereby someone who has died is declared a saint in heaven. (CCC 828)
Canticles	8	A special hymn of praise found in the Bible and used in liturgical services especially the Liturgy of the Hours.

Church	1	The people of God, the Body of Christ, the Temple of the Holy Spirit. (CCC 763-766)
Ciborium	5	The covered container for the consecrated host, the Body of Christ; it is reserved in the tabernacle.
Cincture	5	The rope-like belt worn by a priest or altar server around the alb.
Clergy	6	Men who are ordained in the Sacrament of Holy Orders for the service of God and the Church. (CCC 1562-1568)
Commandment	2	A law given to God's people to help them live the way God wants his people to live. (CCC 2052, 2056-2063)
Commission	6	The act of choosing to sin by doing something contrary to God's commandments.
Communal Prayer	3	A manner of praying with a gathering of people.
Communion of Saints	3	The gathering of the whole Church of Christ; those on earth, in purgatory and those in heaven. (CCC 946-948, 954)

Martyr	5	One who voluntarily dies for the sake of giving witness to Jesus Christ. (CCC 2473-2474)
Mary	1	Blessed Virgin, the mother of Jesus, both God and man. (CCC 487-507, 721-725)
Mass	1	The worship of the Church based on the Last Supper; the principal parts are: Introductory Rite, Liturgy of the Word, Liturgy of the Eucharist, Concluding Rite. (CCC 1332,1345-1355)
Matrimony	3	The sacrament that unites a man and a woman to share their love for one another and bring forth children. (CCC 1621-1632)
Meditation	4	Mental prayer in which, in order to respond to the Lord, one tries to understand more fully or deeply God's Revelation of the truths of the faith. (CCC 2705-2708)
Memorials	3	Liturgies that celebrate minor events in the life of the Blessed Virgin Mary and of saints significant to local country, Church or religious community.

Morning Prayer	4	Part of the Liturgy of the Hours prayed each morning; it consists of psalms, canticles, readings and intercessions for all God's people; also called Lauds.
Mortal Sin	5	Sin that breaks a person's covenant with God; something very grave, a person knows it is wrong and the person chooses to do it. (CCC 1854-1861)
Mystery	5	A truth that is above human reason; a divinely revealed truth; it can be understood to some degree when revealed by God. (CCC 42-43)
Mystical Body of Christ	5	A term used by Saint Paul in the letter to the Corinthians to describe the Church; explains the unity of the members with Jesus Christ that takes place at Baptism. (CCC 787-791)
Nativity	1	The feast of the birthday of Jesus Christ; the feast is also known as Christmas.
New Covenant	4	A sacred agreement between God and his people established by Jesus Christ and completing the Old Covenant established between God and Moses. (CCC 1965-1974)
New Testament	2	The second major part of the Bible that tells the good news of Jesus Christ and is made up of twenty-seven books, including the Gospels, the Epistles, the Acts of the Apostles and the Apocalypse. (CCC 120)
Novena	5	A public or private devotion for nine consecutive days.
Oil of Catechumens	5	Oil blessed by the Bishop at the Chrism Mass during Holy Week and used in preparing a candidate for the Sacrament of Baptism. (CCC 1241)
Oil of Chrism	5	Oil and balsam consecrated by the Bishop at the Chrism Mass during Holy Week and used for baptisms and confirmations in each parish for the coming year; also used to anoint men to the Sacrament of Holy Orders. (CCC 1183, 1241)
Oil of Sick	3	Oil blessed by the bishop at the Chrism Mass during Holy Week and used throughout the diocese in the coming year for the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. (CCC 1241)
Old Testament	2	The first major part of the Bible, made up of 46 books, which foretell the coming of the Savior. (CCC 121-123)
Omission	6	The act of choosing to sin by not doing something that should be done by a disciple of Jesus Christ.
One	3	One of the four marks of the Church; there is one God, one Lord, one faith and one Baptism. (CCC 813-822)
Ordinary Time	2	The numbered weeks of the Liturgical Year that follow Advent/Christmas then Lent/Easter.
Original Sin	3	The decision by Adam and Eve to disobey the commandment of God, by which they lost the grace of original holiness. (CCC 388-390)
Outreach	8	Service to the poor and needy.
Parable	3	A short story used by Jesus to explain a truth about the Kingdom of God. (CCC 546)
Palms	1	Palm branches are blessed and distributed on Palm Sunday; they are carried in procession to commemorate the triumphant entrance of Jesus into Jerusalem, Mt. 21:1-9.
Paraclete	3	A name for the Holy Spirit, defender or advocate. (CCC 692)

Parish	1	A group of people who are registered and worship at a particular Church within a diocese. (CCC 2179)
Parousia	8	The second coming of Christ when his triumph over evil will be complete and his kingdom established. (CCC 671-674)
Paschal Candle	3	The large candle that is lit at the Easter Vigil and during the Easter Season; it is a symbol of Jesus, the Light of the World; it is also used at funerals.
Paschal Mystery	4	The work of Jesus Passion, Death, Resurrection and glorious Ascension. (CCC 571)
Passover	6	A solemn Jewish feast commemorating the deliverance of the Israelites from the bondage of slavery in Egypt, Ex. 12. For Christians, it is the sacrifice of Christ by which humankind was freed from the bondage of sin and led into the freedom of the sons and daughters of God. (CCC 1164)
Pastor	1	The priest who leads a parish entrusted to him by the Bishop; it means shepherd.
Paten	5	The plate that is used to hold the bread that will become the Body of Christ.
Patron Saint	5	The saint for which a person or church is named.
Penance	2	A Sacrament of Healing in which a person celebrates God's forgiveness of sin; recites prayers or performs actions undertaken to indicate a sorrow for wrong with a desire to live a more Christ-centered life. (CCC 1440-1470)
Pentateuch	6	The collective name given to the first five books of the Bible: Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy. (CCC 702)
Pentecost	7	A liturgical solemnity celebrated fifty days after Easter; it celebrates the coming of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles, Acts 2:1-11; it is the birthday of the Church. (CCC 731-732)
Pope	2	The successor of St. Peter; the Vicar of Jesus Christ and the Bishop of Rome; the visible head on earth of the Roman Catholic Church. (CCC 882)
Praise	1	A form of prayer which honors God for who he is as God.
Prayer	1	Listening, talking to or just being still with God; prayer is private, communal, or liturgical. (CCC 2559-2565)
Precepts of the Church	5	Positive laws imposed on the faithful by the Church for living out what it means to be a Roman Catholic. (CCC 2041-2043)
Prejudice	6	A biased opinion against a person, religion, race, or gender.
Presider Chair	3	The chair from which the priest leads worship and sits during the Mass.
Priest	3	The second degree of ordination; one who is ordained by the Bishop to guide and serve the spiritual needs of the people of God. (CCC 1547-1554)
Priesthood of the Faithful	5	Christ gives the faithful a share in his priesthood through the Sacraments of Baptism and Confirmation. (CCC 784, 1119, 1546)
Private Prayer	3	An individual's relationship with God, the Blessed Mother or a saint.

Processional Cross	3	The cross/crucifix that leads the processions at Mass.
Prophet	3	Those, in the Old Testament, who wrote or spoke under divine inspiration to make known the will of God. One who calls people to remember the truth of God. (CCC 702)
Psalm	2	A prayer in the Book of Psalms in the Bible in the form of hymns or poetry; there are one hundred fifty psalms. (CCC 2597)
Purgatory	4	A state of purification after death for those who are not yet ready to enter into heaven. (CCC 1030-1032)
RCIA	5	The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults is the normative process for those over seven years of age seeking the Sacraments of Initiation.
Real Presence	2	The true presence of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist under the appearance of bread and wine. (CCC 1373-1377)
Relic	4	Part of the physical remains of a saint; an object or clothing used by a saint; an object touched to the remains of what a saint used or wore; the relics of martyrs and other saints are placed in the altar stone of a fixed altar.
Reconciliation	2	A name given to the Sacrament of Penance in which one seeks forgiveness for one's sins and is brought to right relationship with God, self and others. (CCC 1440-1498)
Redemption	8	The act of Jesus" Passion, Death, and Resurrection that set us free from sin and makes it possible for the baptized to enter heaven. (CCC 571)
Religion	1	The set of beliefs, way of life, and way of worship that a person embraces as a faith response to God. (CCC 2095-2096, 2135)
Respect	1	The attitude of treating a person or object with kindness and thoughtfulness.
Responsibility	3	Accountability for one's actions to the extent that they are voluntary. (CCC 1734-1735)
Resurrection	2	Christ's rising from the dead on Easter Sunday; it is the central theme of the apostle's preaching. (CCC 638, 648-655)
Revelation	6	The act of God revealing truths about himself in the Scriptures. (CCC 74-79)
Reverence	4	Treating a person, place or object with respect.
Rite	5	A term used to describe the rituals in liturgical worship; the words and actions that belong to a religious ceremony. (CCC 1125, 1203)
Rosary	4	A devotion in honor of the Blessed Mother; it includes meditation on the main mysteries of the life of Jesus Christ. (CCC 2676, 2708)
Sacrament	1	A sign of grace, given by Christ to the Church; gives worship to God and helps the life of Christ to grow in the faithful; there are seven sacraments. (CCC 1113-1134, 1210-1211)
Sacramentals	1	Sacred signs which resemble the sacraments; some well-known sacramentals are blessings by a priest, blessed palms, blessed candles, blessed medals and holy water. (CCC 1667-1673)

Sanctuary	3	The place in the Church where the Blessed Sacrament is reserved in the tabernacle. It contains the altar, ambo and presider schair; a light, the sanctuary lamp, is always lit to show the presence of Jesus Christ.
Satan	4	A fallen angel or the devil; the Evil One. (CCC 391-395)
Scripture, Sacred	1	The written and authoritative word of God as inspired by the Holy Spirit, the Bible. (CCC 81)
Seal of Confession	5	The secrecy demanded of the confessor in the Sacrament of Penance; no reason whatever justifies the breaking of this seal. (CCC 1467, 2490)
Sin	1	An offense against God and reason; a free and willing turning away from his love and his law; a person knows the thought, word or action is wrong, and chooses to do it. (CCC 1849-1850)
Social Sin	6	A result of original sin, it is an unjust condition that is prevalent in society, such as, slavery, oppression of women, racism, and bigotry. (CCC 1869)
Solemnity	3	Liturgies that celebrate events in the life of Jesus Christ, beliefs in the Catholic faith, and persons of principal importance and significance.
Solidarity	4	The Catholic Social Teaching that calls us to care for the poor, vulnerable, and those who are facing unjust conditions. (CCC 1942)
Soul	1	The spiritual part of a person created by God; it is immortal. (CCC 363-367)
Spiritual Works of Mercy	4	Seven ways a Christian is called to attend to the spiritual needs of others. (CCC 2447)
Stations of the Cross	5	A devotion to commemorate Jesus" journey to his crucifixion. (CCC 2669)
Steward	4	One who responds to the call to care for all of God's creation.
Stewardship	4	The responsibility to care for all of God's creation recognizing that every gift of nature and grace comes from God. (CCC 2417)
Stole	5	The scarf-like vestment, which is a sign of ordination, which a priest wears around his neck and a deacon wears over his left shoulder when performing sacramental duties.

Temptation	2	An enticement to do wrong; a time of choice whether or not to perform an action. (CCC 405, 409, 538)
Ten Commandments	4	The ten laws God gave Moses so that God's people would know how to live a life freed from slavery to sin. (CCC 2052-2055, 2067)
Thanksgiving	5	The attitude to which a person is called to live in gratitude for salvation through Jesus Christ; Eucharistic means thanksgiving.
Theological Virtues	4	The three virtues that are the source of all other virtues: faith, hope, and love, that are given to a person in Baptism. (CCC 1812-1829)
Tithe	6	The practice of donating a portion of one's income to God.
Torah	6	The first five books of the Bible; also known as the Pentateuch. (CCC 1961)
Tradition	7	The living transmission of the message of the Gospel in the Church from one generation to the next. (CCC 80-83)
Transubstantiation	7	The unique change of the bread and wine during the Eucharistic Prayer, with the words of consecration, into the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ. (CCC 1373-1377)
Triduum	4	The liturgical celebration of three days that is the remembrance of Christ's Passion, Death and Resurrection; it comprises the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday, the Celebration of the Lord's Passion on Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil.
Trinity	1	The mystery of faith that there is one God in three Persons, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. (CCC 234)
Truth	4	A belief held through faith in God. (CCC 2465-2466)
Vatican II	8	A gathering of the Bishops of the Church in the Vatican in Rome; called by Pope John XXIII from 1962 to 1965 that called for renewal in the Church.
Venial Sin	4	Sin that does not destroy the divine life in the soul but wounds it. (CCC 1854, 1862-1863)
Vice	7	A habit acquired by repeated sin against the laws of God.
Virtue	7	A habit of doing good that enables a person to act according to right reason. (CCC 1804-1809, 1812-1813)
